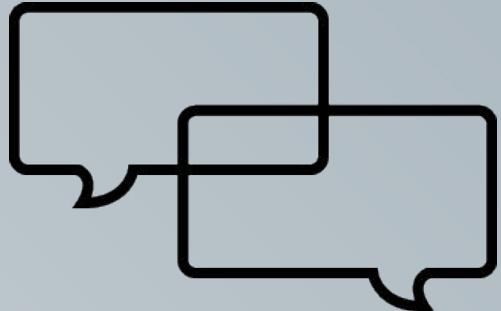

What makes collaboration difficult?

What is collaboration?

- Red Hat defines Collaboration as “Invite cooperation and productive dialogue to create better solutions”...
 - through inclusivity -- and inviting feedback, listening, and integrating
- But it’s more... it’s negotiation.
 - It’s more than coordination and cooperation
 - That’s why it’s so difficult

What does good look like?

NOT ENOUGH

May take action and make decisions without incorporating others' perspectives, involvement, or expertise; excludes relevant stakeholders from important conversations



TOO MUCH

May display excessive concern for consensus or create paralysis in situations that require action

Tips for success

- Be accepting of differences, rather than trying to make everyone behave as you think they should
- Set the engagement rules early (define the process, the schedule, and what is expected of participants)
- Use multiple methods for collecting and integrating feedback

Common challenges (and solutions)

- Time zones, working hours
- Personality and cultural differences
- Difficult people, difficult situations
